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COLLECTING GUAM

On June 8th Harry gave a presentation consisting of the geography and history of <u>Guam</u> combined with stamps and items of postal history.

"I was stationed on Guam for two and a half years from 1969 to 1971." He included included various photos taken while there and other items of interest.

The postal history of Guam starts with the Spanish. Fernando Magellan first discovered the island. Prior to the United States winning the islands as a result of the Spanish American War, the Spanish used overprinted stamps of the Philippines in the Mariana Islands. This included Guam, Saipan and Tinian. It is usually difficult or impossible to determine which island the mail...

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The Dallas Park-Cities Philatelic Society is a chapter member of the Texas Philatelic Association (TPA Chapter #40) and the American Philatelic Society (APS# 0835-068806).

The purpose of the club is to provide social interaction with local philatelist, from the newest collector to those who have been collecting for a lifetime. 

Smithsonian Stamp Specialist Speaks to DPCPS

Alexander Haimann is a Collections Specialist at the Smithsonian National Postal Museum and founder of the American Philatelic Society's Young Philatelic Leaders Fellowship. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the American Stamp Dealers Association and the publicist for the United State Philatelic Classics Society. His national and international society memberships include the American Philatelic Society, United States Stamp Society, Collectors Club of New York and the Royal Philatelic Society

London. On July 13th DPCPS was honored to have him speak about his experiences in the philatelic world.

He is twenty-five and began collecting at the age of seven. He opened his own stamp business at the age of twelve with his cousin Bret Hoffman who was sixteen, renting a table at a local Detroit show. His stamp business continues under the same name, the Bretalex Stamp Company although he bought

out his cousin's interest. He collects primarily, but not exclusively United States Postal History of the first hundred years, 1847 to 1947. One of his most prized possessions is a Penny Black cover with his father's initials in the corners of the stamp along with his father's birth date in the cancellation. He indicates he has no problem being both a stamp dealer and a collector but concedes that it this possible because of his narrow collecting interests that do not conflict with the items he sells.

Alex is a very energetic, enthusiastic and entertaining speaker. He spoke at length on his work at



the Smithsonian using a Power Point presentation to show many rare and interesting items including many at the British Postal Museum which he has had significant access to. He is very upbeat concerning the future of philately in this country resulting from a resurgence of interest with young people. He had been very instrumental in developing and promoting philately in schools across the country. He has a unique method of introducing children and young people to stamps.

Rather than talk directly about stamp

collecting he makes the connection to what they may currently be studying by showing Postal History and other items related to the subject and allowing them to actually hold pieces of history in their hands. Additionally through the APS he introduces promising young philatelists to mentors including seasoned collectors, dealers, exhibitors and authors. From this they have opportunities to travel and develop a year-long project in one of several areas.



Alex spoke at length regarding his early experiences in stamp collecting and his interest in Postal History. One of his many stories relate to how he'd use his allowance to buy and sell stamps at shows to increase his assets so he could purchase a particular item that he really wanted. There are many more stories and events he spoke of that I can not possibly remember.

His presentation was well received and enjoyed. He offered to speak again at the August 10th meeting and was enthusiastically invited back.

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...originated on. Other rarer items with Spanish origin were issued prior to the Mariana overprints.

Beginning in 1899, stamps of the United States overprinted "Guam", were used for postage and was under the jurisdiction of the Navy. There was no local delivery and all mail was posted in Agana (now Hagåtña the capital of Guam). Regular stamps of the United States were authorized for use beginning in 1901. However, Guam overprints continued to be used until about 1905.

The Guam Guard Mail stamps came into use in 1930 and were authorized by the local Navy Commander Willis W. Bradley. The purpose of these stamps was to provide local delivery around the island. They became quite popular and again were replaced by regular U.S. stamps in 1931. There are many "Cinderella" Guam Guard mail items around that have no postal validity that were created by the Guam Tourist Bureau.

In the 1930's Pan American Airlines used Guam as a stop during its original survey flights creating another niche for Air Mail fans.

During World War II the Japanese occupied the island. Covers and stamps from this period are very scarce.

After World War II the United States again took control of the islands. Guam remains an interesting area for postal history.




Above: Apra Harbor, the western-most point of U.S. Territory. Below: The Flag of Guam

I have an album where I place covers which to me are of unusual interest. They probably have little if no monetary value; all were found in the cheapest cover sales boxes. What separates each from the trash can is its historical connection.

The first item is Government Form R-129 Approved Budget Bureau-08-R417 (insignificant information for this, or any discussion of the item.)

It is a mail in application for War Ration Book No.3 - postmarked June 7, 1943. What I find unusual is the mailing instruction in the upper left hand corner -" 2 cents if mailed in Newark, N.J. and 3 cents if mailed elsewhere." I have never seen this before. Can anyone offer an explanation, other than conjecture?

Very few, if any non-Texans would recognize the significance of the second cover. Once a flourishing mining town straddling Highway 67 between Marfa and Presidio, Shafter is now a Ghost Town.

A knowledge of history caused me to rescue the third cover. It is postmarked April 9, 1933.

Anton J. Cermak was the Mayor of Chicago. What is meant by the inscription "I am glad it was me instead of you"?

One month before, he was in Miami, Florida riding in an open air touring car with the newly inaugurated President of The United States - Franklin Delano Roosevelt. An assassin's bullet missed FDR and killed the Mayor. Note the misprint in the cachet - The date on the right hand margin is 1931, not the correct date of 1933.

I was attracted to the fourth cover by the seal on the reverse side of the envelop. The I.W.W. aka The Wobblies is labor union formed in 1904, which, believe it or not, still exists! The history of the Union is known to those of us who studied American History in college. The letter is addressed to Frank Bohn one of the

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founders of the Union. It is suggested that you read his bio, - http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Frank Bohn (socialist). Regrettably the envelop is without contents and the sender's first name or initials are illegible.

Collecting Texas Postal History

PETROLIA, TEXAS HELIUM PLANT 1921

The town of Petrolia, TX was formed in 1904. Petrolia is located 15 miles east of Wichita Falls. The area was formerly known as Oil City due to the discovery of oil by JW Lochridge in 1901. The oil field was the first discovered in North Texas. Mr. Lochridge first used the oil to dip his cattle in it to kill parasites! With the establish of the Wichita Falls and Oklahoma Railroad railway, the town of Oil City moved three miles north to the


present location of Petrolia. The first post office was established in 1904. The community continued to grow with the discovery of a natural gas field in 1907. The Texas Handbook Online noted that gambling, drinking and prostitution were rampant in this oil boomtown. In 1918 the Department of

Interior established one of three experimental helium plants in Petrolia (the other two were in Fort Worth). The covers shown here are two Department of Interior Penalty Envelops sent in 1921. Figure 1 shows a penalty envelope with an address window. A hand stamp under the Department of Interior return address states "U.S. Government"



Experiment Station, Helium Plant No, 3, Petrolia, Texas." Figure 2 is a regular Department of Interior Penalty envelope addressed to the L.S. Starrett Company in Athol, Massachusetts. L.S. Starrett was established in 1880 and is still in business today. It manufactures precision tools, gages and measurement

tools. No doubt Helium Plant No. 3 was making some sort of inquiry to L.S. Starrett concerning the production of helium at their plant. By 1925, the source for helium in the gas field discovered in 1907 was depleted and the plant was closed down
