Exhibits were only 40 frames for Expo 2022, again placed in a separate room, which opened up the ballroom space for more dealers and allowed 'social distancing'. Three APS-certified judges came from Houston and Virginia.

The awards banquet presented certificates and medals to deserving exhibitors, including Grand Award to Dr. Ben Termini for his nine-frame 'Prostitute Revenues of Rosario de Santa Fe' and Reserve Grand Award to Ray Cartier for his eight-frame space exhibit 'How We Got Men ToThe Moon'. The single-frame Grand Award went to 'Michigan Pioneer Air Mail' by Pat Walker. Ray Cartier also showed his six-frame 'Warbirds of AF Plant #4 – Fort Worth, Texas' which is the subject of his presentation to our DPCPS meeting on January 25th

The guest speaker for the awards banquet was judge John Hotchner of Falls Church, Virginia, on the future of stamp collecting – neither doomsday nor rosy, but with many possibilities. Mr. Hotchner has been an exhibitor since 1976 and an accredited APS judge since 1986, best known for his Linn's weekly "U.S. Notes" column.

Two frames were set aside for smaller one-page or fourpage exhibits. I exhibited my 'Warrior Poets' and 'Slogan Cancels'. Ray Cartier showed his 'The First Soviet Manned Program: Vostok 1-6' with cosmonaut-autographed covers. After a guest exhibit did not arrive, former MCSC member Dr. John Barrett of Biloxi filled in with an exhibit on classic 'Swiss Forgeries'.

DPCPS also participated again with our 'Club Frame' to show our members' varied interests, receiving thanks from exhibits chairman Ray Cartier for our support of the Expo and exhibiting, and also a nice 'Certificate of Participation' from MCSC.

Our 'Club Frame' included a title page providing time and location of our DPCPS meetings and a roster of our fifteen pages from eleven participating members, shown in the next column.

Most of these pages were shown earlier in the *Stamp & Tongs* issue of August 2022 from our 'Club Frame' at OKPEX 2022 in June. Images follow for the six pages (\*) which were not previously published in the newsletter.

## USPS POSTAGE RATE HIKE

## From the USPS Newsroom

Effective January 22nd, the cost of a First-Class Mail Forever stamp rose rom 60 cents to 63 cents., domestic post card rate increased from 44 cents to 48 cents, international post cards and 1 oz. letters increased from \$1.40 to \$1.45.

As operating expenses continue to rise, these price adjustments provide the Postal Service with much needed revenue to achieve the financial stability sought by its Delivering for America 10-year plan.


### Transatlantic Flight of Charles A. Lindberg

At 7:52 A.M., on May 20, 1927 Charles Lindbergh gunned the engine of the "Spirit of St Louis" and aimed her down the dirt runway of Roosevelt Field, Long Island. Heavily laden with 450 gallons of fuel, the plane bounced down the muddy field, gradually became airborne and barely cleared the telephone wires at the field's edge. The crowd of 500 thought they had witnessed a miracle. Thirty-three and one half-hours and 3,500 miles later he landed in Paris, the first to fly the Atlantic alone.

Lindbergh insisted that unnecessary weight be eliminated from the aircraft, even going so far as to cut the top and bottom off of his flight map. He carried no radio in order to save weight and because the radios of the period were unreliable and difficult to use while flying solo. Although he was an airmail pilot, he refused to carry souvenir letters on the transatlantic journey, insisting that every spare ounce be devoted to fuel. The fuselage of the Spirit of St. Louis was made of treated fabric over a metal tube frame, while the wings were made of fabric over a wood frame. Plywood material was used to build most of Lindbergh's plane.

hall built in the 15th century, originally constructed in the Gothic style, and remodeled at the end of the 16th century in a classic Renaissance manner, topped off with gargoyles and a 30m tower from

which Tarnów's 'hejnat' – a short bugle melody – is played every day at 12:00. Rather amusingly, 12:00 depends on which side of the building you're on, as the time displayed by the Town Hall's two clocks (located just below the tower) differs by two

Tarnów (pronounced TAR-nuf) is a city in Poland, about 50 miles east of Kraków. It boasts of a town

the Town Hall's two clocks (located just below the tower) differs by two minutes. This can be forgiven however, when one considers that the manually wound clock has otherwise operated flawlessly since the 1600s. The Town Hall is shown on the stamp in Figure 1.







Figure 2. Austria Scott QE3 (1917 2h Special Handling), overprinted with a Polish eagle. Issued by Tarnów in December 1918

I could only find one stamp Poland issued about Tarnów. However, during the early days of the Second Polish Republic (1918-1939), Polish postage stamps were not immediately available and Tarnów issued local stamps by overprinting Austrian stamps with a Polish eagle (an example is provided in Figure 2) or "Rzp. Polska" (Republic of Poland, as in Figure 3). Tarnów was part of Austria prior to 1918.



# USPS REVEALS MORE STAMPS FOR 2023

## From the USPS Newsroom

On December 13, 2022, .announced seven new stamp subjects for 2023.

John Lewis - This stamp celebrates the life and legacy of



civil rights leader and U.S. Rep. John Lewis (1940-2020) of Georgia. Devoted to equality and justice for all Americans, Lewis spent more than 30 years in Congress steadfastly defending and building on key civil rights gains that he had helped achieve in the 1960s. Even in the face of hatred and violence, as well as some 45 arrests, Lewis remained resolute in his commitment to what he liked to call "good trouble." The stamp features a photograph of Lewis taken by Marco Grob on assignment for the Aug. 26,

2013, issue of Time magazine. The selvage showcases a photograph of Lewis taken by Steve Schapiro in 1963 outside a workshop about nonviolent protest in Clarksdale, MS. Derry Noyes served as art director for this project.

Art of the Skateboard—The bold artwork on a skateboard deck is often as eye-catching and individualistic as a skater's most breathtaking moves. These four stamps celebrate the Art of the Skateboard with vibrant designs that capture skateboarding's

The illustrated cover from Kyiv to the U.S. includes Ukrainian stamps showing Polish-Ukrainian solidarity with hands and flags and the Polish inscription, "W trudnych czasach, cenimy prawdziwą przyjaźń!" which translates to "In hard times we value true friendship!".

excitement. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the stamp issuance using photographs of skateboards created by artist Crystal Worl, an Alaskan whose blue and indigo salmon formline design expresses her Tlingit/Athabascan heritage; self-taught artist William James Taylor Jr. of Virginia, who created an energetic red and orange graphic abstraction; Di'Orr Greenwood of Arizona who represents her Navajo culture with a turquoise-inlaid skateboard that features eagle feathers and colors of the rising or setting sun and Colombian-born, Washington, DC-raised muralist MazPaz (Federico Frum), who painted a stylized jaguar.

## Florida Everglades (Priority Mail)

Spanning some 2 million acres in southern Florida,



from Lake
Okeechobee to
Florida Bay, the
Everglades is one of the
largest wetlands in the world
and the most significant
breeding ground for tropical
wading birds in North
America. This new Priority
Mail stamp celebrates the

Florida Everglades with stamp art that shows a sawgrass marsh as seen at sunset from the edge of a cypress dome. Designed by art director Greg Breeding, the stamp showcases a digital illustration by Dan Cosgrove. The Florida Everglades Priority Mail stamp will be issued in Homestead, FL, on Jan. 22 without a ceremony.

### Tomie dePaola

This stamp honors prolific children's book author and illustrator Tomie dePaola

(1934-2020), whose extraordinarily varied body of work encompasses folktales and legends, informational books, religious and holiday stories, and touching autobiographical tales. The stamp art features a detail from the cover of "Strega



Nona" (1975), the Caldecott Honor winning first book in the series. Set in southern Italy, the gently humorous story focuses on Strega Nona, "Grandma Witch," who uses magic to help with matters of the heart and to cure her neighbors' ills. Art director Derry Noyes designed the stamp with Tomie dePaola's original art.

## **Northern Cardinal (Stamped Envelope)**



The Northern Cardinal stamped envelope showcases one of the most beloved and popular songbirds native to North America. The art features a male cardinal, immediately recognizable by its crimson-colored feathers and black facial markings. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the stamped envelope with Kandis Vermeer Phillips's highly realistic illustration.

### **Bridges (Presorted First-Class Mail)**









Four new Presorted First-Class Mail stamps will be available for purchase by bulk mail users in coils of 3,000 and 10,000. The stamps feature existing photographs of four different bridges that range from modern to historic, pedestrian to carcarrying, but all are important landmarks in their communities. They are the Arrigoni Bridge in Middletown, CT; the Bob Kerrey Pedestrian Bridge in Omaha, NE; the Skydance Bridge in Oklahoma City; and the Iowa-Illinois Memorial Bridge in Bettendorf, IA, and Moline, IL. Art director Ethel Kessler designed the stamps with existing photographs.

### Life Magnified

These stamps reveal life on Earth like many have never seen it. Twenty stamps feature 20 different images taken with microscopes and highly specialized photographic techniques that capture details of life undetectable by the human eye. The images show the phenomena of life in exquisitely fine detail. While stunning on their own as works of art, these images also hold scientific significance. Art director Derry Noyes designed the stamps using existing photographs.
